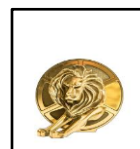

You've probably heard of the Cannes Film Festival. That gathering inspired leaders in communications and advertising to create The Cannes Lions International Festival of Creativity in 1954. Beat the Connecticut cold and join us on the sunny French Riviera, as we view the works that have won this prestigious award. We watch some of the funniest, most moving marketing and public service campaigns from across the globe and hear from the people who created them. French beach attire optional.



Frank Izzo began his copywriting career at Grey Advertising in the mid 70's, just as the creative revolution was winding down. Over the course of his career, he has been a student of the top awards shows in the world, inspiring his own creativity. Although he has never won a Cannes Lion, he has been a finalist in many shows, from the Clios to the Andy Awards.

Dante and the Modern World – Free Class!

Despite being one of the greatest writers to have ever lived, Dante Alighieri is spoken of with as much reverence and grandeur as Shakespeare, although his works remain less known to the general audience. In a time when the most fundamental roots of our concepts as a modern western culture are being questioned, it is important to understand how our culture was formed by the merging of two different worlds to create our modern worldview. We review and discuss *The Inferno* to show how Dante's unique hybridization created the fundamental axioms of the humanist revolution.



Benjamin Steiz, a graduate of Simon's Rock and Bard College, had a double major in creative writing and philosophy. Interested in history and philosophy from a young age, he is a Dante scholar.

Gershwin's Golden Goose – Free Class!

It was the night of Oct. 14, 1930. Ethel Merman, then a 21-year-old newcomer to show biz, introduced to the world one of the greatest showstoppers ever — George and Ira Gershwin's *I Got Rhythm*. Driving the crowd wild was also a hot band including Red Nichols, Benny Goodman, Gene Krupa and Glenn Miller, all in their twenties and at the beginning of their careers. Although the original show, *Girl Crazy*, has been largely forgotten, *I Got Rhythm* took on a life of its own as a musical golden goose. It inspired Gershwin's own variations for piano orchestra as well as over 200 other elaborations by the likes of Duke Ellington, Benny Goodman, Cab Calloway, Charlie Parker and many others. It was also the basis for The Flintstones theme song and Nat King Cole's *Straighten Up and Fly Right*. We explore the many facets of this *I Got Rhythm* story.



Dr. Joshua Berrett earned a BA from the University of Cape Town in South Africa, an MA from Columbia University, and a PhD from the University of Michigan. He studied at the Manhattan School of Music, Juilliard, and the Tanglewood Music Center. He is a Professor Emeritus at Mercy College, a freelance violinist and the author of many publications on music. With his wife, Lynne, he is co-founder of the non-profit Ageless Mind Project, Inc.

Jacques Brel: Master of the French Chanson – Free Class!

Remember Jacques Brel's well-known song, *If you Go Away*. We discuss the high points of some selected songs. Born in Brussels, Belgium in 1929, Brel began his career in 1953, establishing himself as a singer/songwriter, actor and director developing a cult-like following as a modern master of French chanson. English translations are given for the selected songs in this journey through the interesting and highly personal music of this master of French theatrical song style. Many of his best-known songs were presented in the 1968 off-Broadway revue, *Jacques Brel is Alive and Well and Living in Paris*. Dr. Joe plays this iconic music for us on a piano keyboard in his own creative style.



Joe Utterback earned his MA in Piano Performance from Wichita State University and his Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Kansas. He has a total of 450 published jazz and classical compositions. Dr. Joe has been Music Director and organist of the First Congregational Church of Stratford for the past 21 years and has been teaching music at Sacred Heart University for 28 years. He has taught for 15 years at LLI and he continues to perform throughout the U.S. and around the world.

Literature, Theatre, Law and Society – Free Class!

Join us as we discuss two noted court cases. The first, *US vs. Ulysses*, examines the New York federal court decision holding that James Joyce's masterpiece did not violate obscenity laws. The second case, involving the law of torts, is presented through the film, "The Fortune Cookie," in which Walter Matthau portrays a personal injury attorney representing his brother-in-law, played by Jack Lemmon, in this satire involving a fraudulent lawsuit.



Art Gang graduated New York University with honors in English; received awards in Constitutional Law and Social Service from Brooklyn Law School; and Candidate, Masters in American Studies from Fairfield University. He practiced as an attorney for 40 years and lectures frequently on legal and insurance issues.

National Historical Sites in This Area and The History They Tell – Free Class!

Using the National Parks as a touchstone is very pertinent to many issues facing us today. Weir Farm, The Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, Federal Hall, The African Burial Ground, Grant's Tomb, as well as Hamilton Grange, the Theodore Roosevelt birthplace and Castle Clinton are all within a 50-mile radius of the Norwalk Community College. All depict the history of the United States and how far it has progressed as a nation in some areas, and where it has failed, in others. These parks are fun places to visit as well.



Allan J Despres, a native of Fairfield County, loves history and has been able to live that love, working as a United States Park Ranger in many of the sites mentioned above. Allan has addressed groups visiting the national parks and has conducted outreach programs in surrounding communities. He developed art programs at the Statue of Liberty and did a full summer of lectures and discussions on civil rights at Grant's Tomb.

The Library Suite – Free Class!

The Library Suite is a coordinated series of musical jazz pieces composed by Mark Edinberg. Mark initiated the idea of composing a jazz work that celebrates libraries and enlisted local artist and library enthusiast Dave Pressler to provide the visual context. Dave will reprise it with a presentation of his artwork and photography to the recorded music of *The Library Suite*.



Dave Pressler earned a BFA in Industrial Design from the Rhode Island School of Design. He is a member of the Silvermine Guild Arts Center where he is a former trustee, an officer of the ArtPlace Gallery in Fairfield and is on the Curatorial Committee of the Bruce S. Kershner Gallery at the Fairfield Public Library. His artwork has been distributed throughout Connecticut and beyond.

The Poetry of Leonard Cohen – Free Class!

Why is it that Leonard Cohen receives the sort of reverence we reserve for only a few contemporary artists? Why have his songs, even three or four decades after their original release, graced the charts, blockbuster movie soundtracks and television singing competitions? Poet, novelist, and most famously a songwriter, Leonard Cohen has explored religion, politics, isolation, sexuality and romantic relationships through his art. Using video and audio clips and selected songs we examine the lyrics of some of Cohen's most famous songs, as well as how he developed as an artist in his final decades.



Sandra Soson graduated from University of Michigan and Wesleyan University. She retired from teaching English at Wilton High School in 2014. In recent years she has run the Poetry Out Loud program for local high school students, given writing workshops to adults and taught ESL as a Literacy Volunteer. Sandra has been passionate about poetry her whole life and enjoys sharing this love with others.

Ukulele for Everyone – Free Class!

The ukulele's popularity is trending because it's fun to play and it sparks feelings of well-being and happiness. Through a combination of lectures, demonstrations and music making, learn beginner ukulele songs as a group in a supportive, stress-free setting. There will be opportunities to sing along.



Nina Lesiga facilitates ukulele workshops at Lifetime Learners and at other venues, including UCONN Waterbury, Stratford Continuing Adult Education and the Sterling House Community Center. She has a passion for participatory music in public places where she brings ukuleles with her and gets people to play along for peacemaking and community building.

Woodstock at 50 - Remembering 3 days of Peace, Love and Music – Free Class!

It's been 50 years since the Woodstock festival, widely regarded as a pivotal moment in popular music history, became a defining event for an entire generation. With the help of award winning music videos and documentaries we revisit this famous event and replay many of the iconic music performances: Crosby, Stills, Nash & Young; Melanie; Joan Baez; Santana; The Who; The Grateful Dead; Creedence, Clearwater Revival; Mountain; Janis Joplin and, of course, Jimi Hendrix. Through photos taken by the instructor on visiting the famous site and the Woodstock Festival Museum at Bethel Woods, New York, we once again Remember Woodstock at 50.

Gary Lishnoff is a past president of LLI and has been an LLI instructor for a number of music, history and culture classes including Music of the 1950s and 1960s, American Jewish Identity, American Presidents, The Sixties and The British Invasion.

She shares the lessons she learned in the year spent reviewing, organizing and editing the family's letters, diaries, documents and scrapbooks. Janeen Bjork has combined 30 years of experience as a television researcher and presenter, editor and educator, with her love of family history. A question from one of her genealogy students, "Do you have any ideas for Christmas presents?" took her on an unexpected, challenging, heartfelt and year-long adventure.

January 24 - Therapy Dogs

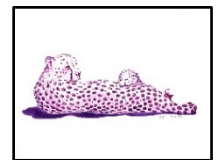
What process does a dog and its handler go through to become a therapy dog team? We gain an understanding of what kind of dog qualifies to be a therapy dog as well as what is the difference between service and an emotional support dog. The speaker presents videos of dogs at work, visiting hospitals, schools and libraries.



Judith P. Audevard and her therapy dogs have worked at various hospitals, assisted living facilities, and schools and colleges in New York and Connecticut. She participates in pre- and post-deployment yellow ribbon events for the military. She is Founder/President of the Hudson Valley Paws for a Cause Pet Therapy Group which was launched in September 2010. She currently supervises a group of over 100 volunteers and their pet partners.

January 31 - Art & Conservation – Working Together to Save Endangered Species

Artist Alison Nicholls discusses how she uses her art to raise awareness and funds for the conservation of endangered species in Africa. She talks about her Conservation Sketching Expeditions and how working with conservationists informed her opinions and changed her art. We learn how art and conservation can be used together, both in Africa and here in the US, to help conserve Africa’s iconic wildlife species.



Alison Nicholls is an artist inspired by Africa. She lived in Botswana and Zimbabwe for several years and returns regularly to sketch in the bush, work with conservation organizations and lead art safaris for Africa Geographic.
