


Zuzana Colahan

Rockson Bajonc

Rockson Bajonc knew he wanted to become a nurse when he watched on television how medical personnel flew from all over the world to assist his country, Haiti, which was in ruins from the 2010 earthquake.

"Nursing is diverse, exciting and always evolving," he said. "I view nurses as expert clinicians, scientists, healers, health translators, communicators, and teachers – all... needed to ensure the health and wellness of individuals, families and communities. Moreover, the warm feeling of helping others out, giving back to the community and influencing the success of worldwide healthcare makes nursing an intrinsically rewarding career to pursue."

Rockson currently works part time to help support his family. This scholarship will allow him to buy more books and take summer classes which are not covered in his Federal grant. Rockson's goal is to achieve his Bachelor and Master's degrees in Geriatric Nursing. He then plans to start a non-profit organization providing healthcare to elderly Haitians and also promoting quality education for Haitian children.
