#### LLI PRESIDENT'S LETTER

We recently completed our Fall term, conducted entirely online via Zoom. It was an unqualified success. Course enrollments exceeded expectations, and no classes were cancelled due to low enrollment. The course evaluations for Fall were mostly outstanding, and there were very few complaints about the Zoom platform.

We are offering several member-only free events during the interim period between Fall and Winter and have a robust set of courses scheduled for Winter term. ## INSTRUCTOR PROFILE: JEAN HOFHEIMER BENNETT

Civics lessons started early for Jeanie Bennett. Her parents talked about current events around



the dinner table, and as each of his four children turned ten, her father (a founding member of Human Rights Watch) took them to Washington, D.C., to tour the Capitol and meet those who represent them. He wanted to teach how wonderful

democracy is and how exciting it is to be a part of it. And his lessons stuck! As a student Jeanie was involved in the civil rights and anti-war movements and heard Martin Luther King, Jr. speak at a 1967 rally against the Vietnam War. She has been politically engaged ever since.

Jeanie became hooked on history thanks to her "amazing" high school history teacher, Eric Rothschild, who sparked her interest in how we as a nation got to where we are today.

Jeanie studied sociology and English and then earned a Masters degree in History Education at NYU, where she did her student teaching in Harlem. She taught for thirty-five years, the last 25 years at Weston High School, where she taught Advanced Placement (A.P.) U.S. History and "Facing History and Ourselves," a human rights course that she brought to the high school (and which she taught at LLI last spring). "I enjoyed teaching as a way to tell my students they matter, and that each of them could make a difference through the lives they led and in the decisions they made." She told her students that her class "was not a spectator sport" and in addition to setting high expectations, she urged her students to keep an open mind. "Each student's interpretation of history is not the only interpretation, and it is important to listen to other views." One of her students referred to her A.P. U.S. History class as "the hardest class you'll ever love!" and many

of her students keep in touch.

Jeanie also served for ten years as a Reader for the College Board, scoring A.P. History essays from students across the country. She is the coauthor of *Cracking the A.P. U.S. History Exam* and contributed to the Thirteenth Edition of *The American Pageant*, which is said to be one of the most popular, effective and entertaining American history texts.

In her retirement Jeanie is still teaching, both at Literacy Volunteers and at LLI. Because many in LLI have lived through much of the history she teaches, she finds that her classes are greatly enriched by their perspectives and contributions to class discussions. Also, LLI students "display a special brand of enthusiasm towards learning."

Jeanie's other passion is music. Growing up she studied piano, accompanied her high school chorus and attended the National Music camp at Interlochen, Michigan, where she picked up guitar. One of the first people she met when she moved to Connecticut, was Sandy Soson, who she was delighted to discover had also attended Interlochen; they've been fast friends ever since. Jeanie also likes to sing and is a member of the 92Y Broadway Chorus in New York City. (Their last performance was March 1<sup>st</sup>, days before the Covid lockdown.) During Covid-time she has found it restorative to start her days by playing music.

Jeanie has three children who received their civics lessons early by accompanying her into the voting booth, through yearly trips to Washington, D.C., and by visiting the National Parks. All of them chose professions of service to others. Her son, an electrician, is a volunteer fireman in Weston, CT; her older daughter works in a skilled nursing facility in Indiana; and her younger daughter teaches middle school Language Arts/Writing in Harlem. Clearly, in her family, democracy is not a spectator sport!

#### Marketing

Steve Matis, chair

- Develops & updates marketing strategies that uphold the mission of the organization.
- Promotes activities and events of the organization.
- Promotes membership.
- Provides timely communication with members.
- Maintains contact with media.
- Coordinates with other committees.

Meets as needed several times a month.

Creates educational and social opportunities for LLI members. Events organized include:
